As the need for instant gratification left me, patience moved in, taking its place and making my life better across the board.

For me, being willing to ask for help and believing it could happen allowed for the patience I needed to counter the defects of my character and the demons of my disease.

So here's one for you. Shortly after I got sober I was having a conversation with my mother about the alcoholic mind.

She has known me all my life, believe that if you will, and was as helpless as anyone watching as I became a very low bottom drunk. I accept the physical allergy and mental illness that is alcoholism. I do, or I drink.

Even to one who wants to understand and loves me as

only a mother can, at one point I said, "You know the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous talks about the mind of the alcoholic. I will do my best to explain, but you might find a copy in a used book store for a couple of bucks. It will explain things much better than I."

The next time I visited my mom there was a copy on the coffee table. But that's not what this story is about. Mom finished the book,including all the stories, and gave me the copy to pass on should the opportunity ever present itself. It did.

One Sunday night a gal

stumbles into a meeting; a couple of days without a drink and, as so many of us are, broke. She did not have a Big Book and I had two. After a confusing attempt to figure out how to get this book into her hands, I finally said, "be at the Big Book study Monday night and I'll have the book." She did.

I did not see her for over a year, but she's sober. Fast forward six more months: I get laid off from work and visit a noon meeting I'm fond of and there she is. Well, several of us with trucks sign up for work with 'Bill W.'s Moving & Storage' and start the next

morning at 8. After we get her moved into her new place, I see that the shower head is missing. She needs a handheld shower and 8 feet of hose. I remembered one had been given to me as a gift a few years back and I never opened it and "here you go." Her friend installed ti and now she has a shower

"Be willing to be of service and the opportunities will always present themselves." I now have had the rare opportunity in a small way to help someone be *clean* and sober (pun intended). Actually, God is responsible for the sober part, I just helped a bit with the clean.

I had never heard anyone pack so much power into one line! It gave me pause to consider how I might "right- size" my long-winded justification for "the dark years." Then it occurred to me: adults don't have to justify! Instead, we learn how to OWN our behavior and chart a new course.
