Well, it didn't happen, that is, until it did. They show up in the "Spiritual Experience" pages IN THE APPENDIX to further explain what *spiritual experience* means and in "We Agnostic"

"Most emphatically we wish to say that any alcoholic capable of honestly facing his problems in the light of our experience can recover, provided he does not close his mind to all spiritual concepts. He can only be defeated by an attitude of intolerance or belligerent denial. We find that no one need have difficulty with the spirituality of the program.

Willingness, honesty and open mindedness are the essentials of recovery. But these are indispensable . "

My experience has shown me that until I am exhausted enough or humbled enough (whichever comes first) I am not able to allow different perspectives in, even if I'm dying. I arrived, by grace I believe, at a place where I no longer had any solutions to my life or alcoholism and AA said they did. I was faced with destruction. Worse than that I was faced with hovering right over destruction living life one miserable day at a time without the relief of destruction that would at least relieve me from myself. At that point my mind became open to the idea that with the help and support of the fellowship and through the working of the Steps, I could meet this Power Greater than myself and be freed from the bondage of alcoholism. Thank goodness that promise came true.

Now this open mindedness still remains key in my life today. When I believe I'm the only one with answers or knowledge, I slam the door shut for my Creator to show me how he/she works through other people as well. I miss the blessings of the day, and more importantly, when I slam the door of my mind shut I shut myself off from the Sunlight of the Spirit and OPEN an opportunity for my alcoholic mind to begin the process of walking me back to a drink and out of the grace I have received. However if I can honestly face my life, I get the chance at life and growth in spiritual concepts. For all of this I am grateful.

Our writers share their experience with journeys into open mindedness. Whether you are new or have been around for a minute or two, I pray that you read something here that speaks to your heart and offers a chance to expand and open your mind. Your very life depends on it!

“Open-mindedness”

There are three places in my sobriety that I found open-mindedness to be essential.

First, I had to open my mind to the idea that my willpower alone would never suffice to keep me from drinking. For me, that was a very difficult thing to keep my mind open about. I had been taught all my life that there was nothing I couldn't do if I set my mind to it. But after literally several thousand failed attempts to control and enjoy my drinking, I was finally beaten into a state of reasonableness – which in this case, meant opening my mind to the idea that there was something I really, truly had no power over.

Second, I had to open my mind to the idea that a Power greater than myself could alleviate my condition – not cure me of alcoholism, but let me live a day at a time without drinking. This was also difficult for me. I had no problem with the idea of God. In fact, I thought I had a pretty good relationship with God because I did the things my religion taught me I needed to do to be close to Him. The problem was that my relationship with God wasn't keeping me sober. So I had to be willing to open my mind to the idea that my relationship with Him had to change.

Third, I had to open my mind to the idea that the problem with my relationship with God had nothing to do with God; it was a problem with me, and specifically with my illusion that I could wrest satisfaction and happiness from this world if only I managed well. That illusion is very persistent, and I still wrestle with it today. Bit by bit, though, by working the steps of AA, I find this illusion start to fall to pieces, and I begin to see that the extent to which I trust God to manage my life is the extent to which I find peace and happiness in a turbulent world.

“I Stopped Fighting”

Hello, my name is Eric, and I'm an alcoholic.

What that means to me, is that I can never take a drink successfully. And, if I don't maintain a program of recovery... I can once again fall back into the defective thinking that says otherwise... that someday, somehow I will control and enjoy my drinking.

I didn't have that conviction coming in the rooms the first time. You hear this in the program all the time... “It takes what it takes.” I had to be put through the ringer over and over before open-mindedness could be achieved. And of course, open-mindedness on its own would not suffice.

This time around getting sober, it was important for me to utilize ALL tools that were laid at my feet. There was a lot going through my head at the time and it was hard to differentiate the truth from the false... so it occurred to me that I couldn't trust my own intuition.

It seemed I could do nothing right. The more I fought, the more I got myself into trouble. *I stopped fighting.* I decided that I'd utilize anything that anyone said helped them. Never has anyone who's worked the Alcoholics Anonymous program suggested anything that has caused me harm. I couldn't deny that what I was up against was cunning, baffling, and powerful. I couldn't deny that the odds were against me. I couldn't deny the horrific turnover rate for people like me... I did what I was told. I listened and did my best to practice these principles in all of my affairs.

If you truly give yourself to this simple program and put it first before ANYTHING else, you cannot fail. This has been my experience.
