2010 INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS



The 2010 International Convention of Alcoholics Anonymous will be held July 1-4 in San Antonio, Texas with the theme "A Vision for You." A.A. Members and guests from around the world will celebrate A.A.'s 75th year at this event with big meetings held Friday night, Saturday night, and Sunday morning in the Alamodome. Other meetings, scheduled or informal, will take place throughout the weekend in the San Antonio Convention Center and local hotels.

Registration opens in the Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center on Wednesday June 30, 2010 at 8:00 a.m. Registration will continue Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The opening Party in the Park starts at approximately 8:00 p.m. Thursday evening, July 1 and ends at midnight.

Marathon Meetings will begin at midnight on Thursday, and run around the clock until Sunday morning. Meetings start at the Convention Center on Friday at 9:00 a.m. and continue until 5:00 p.m., with the same schedule on Saturday.

Friday night and Saturday night meetings are from 8:00 to 10:00 p.m. in the Alamodome Stadium. The Flag Ceremony will take place before the meeting on Friday night, and Saturday we will have an oldtimers meeting, where A.A.'s with more than 40 years of sobriety will share.

The closing meeting will be in the Alamodome on Sunday from 9:00 -11:00 a.m.

Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character

Editorial:

On the 6th Step

This step is most important because here we are ready for God (as we understand Him) to walk along with us and guide us as we seek to improve our character and eliminate the defects which contributed to our alcoholic problem.

With God's help we'll now apologize quickly when we are curt to others. We'll overcome our resentments. We'll become humble and remember it's our own character we want to improve, not the character of others. We'll remember that as we aren't perfect we haven't any particular right to be critical toward others.

We'll ask quickly for help each time we are aware of wrong thinking and whenever we begin to feel sorry for ourselves. When we wish to judge others, we'll remember that not so long ago we were in no position to judge anyone.

Resentments, our biggest stumbling block, can be dropped right here. Resentments against those who loved us and tried to help us; resentments against the boss, against our fellowworker, and all the million other little and big resentments must be turned over to a higher power.

At a later date, as our character becomes sound, we'll find that these resentments disappear.

We must ask God to help us understand others.

It takes a continued program of doing and thinking our best each day to lead us ahead, out into the open, where we can join the company of our fellow men.

The same help we seek in dealing with our alcoholic problem must be used to overcome our other defects. Knowing our problem is in God's hands will give us serenity and peace of mind.

In other words, we will turn our will over to God, asking that His will be done, and we'll work on our defects one by one as they make themselves known to us.



On behalf of A.A. as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of our world services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous.





An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

- 2. Is it good for a group to lease a small building?
- 3. Are all the officers and members of our local club for AAs familiar with "Guidelines on Clubs" (which is available free from GSO)?
- 4. Should the secretary of our group serve on the mayor's advisory committee on alcoholism?
- 5. Some alcoholics will stay around AA only if we have a TV and card room. If this is what is required to carry the message to them, should we have these facilities?

Separate From The Tree

Prior to coming into AA, I loudly proclaimed, "I don't need anyone," while at the same time I was in a lot of pain because of my detachment from people. I detested the thought that I might need people, and yet I'd traded my honesty for the approval of others. I became a firefighter and thought that since I was taking a physical risk this justified the fact that I'd never taken an emotional risk in my life.

I've heard a mother say, "I won't let my baby go in the water until he learns to swim." But ironically if children don't first enter the water, they can't learn. I was faced with the same dilemma upon entering the program--either jump in and trust, or continue with my drunkenness. I learned to trust, and today I have people in my life who know me right down to my socks.

I first had to reveal myself before I could learn about myself. The Greek proverb suggests, "Know yourself," but with a slight paraphrase we can say, "Let yourself be known; you will then know yourself." There is much freedom in allowing myself to be known by others. I learned that I had been my own judge, jury, and executioner.

I still enjoy getting the approval of others and will accept it when it comes, but I refuse to pay the price I used to pay in order to get it. I'm responsible for speaking what I perceive to be the truth, not for saying what I think others may want to hear.

I need people today and am grateful for the awareness. Thinking I didn't need people was like a leaf thinking itself separate from the tree.
