2010 INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS



The 2010 International Convention of Alcoholics Anonymous will be held July 1-4 in San Antonio, Texas with the theme "A Vision for You." A.A. Members and guests from around the world will celebrate A.A.'s 75th year at this event with big meetings held Friday night, Saturday night, and Sunday morning in the Alamodome. Other meetings, scheduled or informal, will take place throughout the weekend in the San Antonio Convention Center and local hotels.

Registration opens in the Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center on Wednesday July 30, 2010 at 8:00 a.m. Registration will continue Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The opening Party in the Park starts at approximately 8:00 p.m. Thursday evening, July 1 and ends at midnight.

Marathon Meetings will begin at midnight on Thursday, and run around the clock until Sunday morning. Meetings start at the Convention Center on Friday at 9:00 a.m. and continue until 5:00 p.m., with the same schedule on Saturday.

Friday night and Saturday night meetings are from 8:00 to 10:00 p.m. in the Alamodome Stadium. The Flag Ceremony will take place before the meeting on Friday night, and Saturday we will have an oldtimers meeting, where A.A.'s with more than 40 years of sobriety will share.

The closing meeting will be in the Alamodome on Sunday from 9:00 -11:00 a.m.

Step Seven: a Lifetime Supply

Coming into AA and finding the acceptance and love I'd sought in a bottle was a relief beyond description, but reading the Steps was a shock. Fortunately for me, my home group did not hammer the Steps into newcomers. Rather, they talked a lot about the Slogans and the need to not drink a day at a time. I needed that.

During a discussion of Step Seven, I made the statement, "If my shortcomings and character defects are removed, there will be nothing left!" I need not have feared. What I've learned since then is that I have more than a lifetime's supply of character defects. My Higher Power and I can't get rid of them all in my allotted time on this earth.

More importantly, I've learned that if I simply let go of a character defect--release it--my Higher Power will replace it with a character asset. As I release anger, I find that I am friendlier. As I release hate, I become more loving. As I release fear, I become more secure. I don't have to go out looking for friendliness, love, security, or any other trait that I desire. I just have to give up the feelings that are manifestations of my character defects and the good automatically flows into my life.... And I used to think that I would become hollow without my character defects!


So, how does it work? Daily. On a daily basis I choose not to drink--or to fear, hate, be angry, or indulge in any other defect that's raising its ugly head. They're all there waiting, and when given a chance they charge into the center of my life and try to take over. But when I work Step Seven, I find that my life is filled with good, and people actually like to be around me--something they never did in my drinking days.



Never-ending Growth

The dangers of overdoing it

Recently I celebrated ten years of sobriety. I am one of those people who always wants to know how much time someone has in AA. In some ways, I have gauged my program by the programs of others. I've noticed that people who have what I want seem to do a lot of Twelfth Step work, so over the years I've taken on a lot of service positions ranging from making coffee to sponsorship. These service positions have increased as my years of recovery have increased. I never wanted to say no to an AA request because I was afraid that I would be sucked back into the black hole of alcoholism if I wasn't willing to go to any lengths. Over the last year, my home and cell phone were ringing up to ten or more times a day from AA members. Often I would turn my cell off at night and by the next morning there would be five or more voice mails waiting for me. Somewhere in there I was trying to be a wife, daughter, and friend, as well as taking care of my home and two dogs.

I started to become overwhelmed and resentful at the constant needs of AA members interrupting my life, mixed with shame that I could be resentful at the very thing that was such a huge part of my recovery. In the last twelve months, I started to experience a lot of illnesses along with fatigue and depression. I also started screening my phone calls and not answering the phone. I couldn't figure out why I was feeling so horrible when I was doing everything that had been asked of me.

Thankfully, I have a connection with God and work with a sponsor. I had to pray, write, talk, and cry my way through the process of uncovering and discovering what was happening to me. It turns out that my sobriety is not contingent on quantity as much as quality. I don't have to be all things to all people. I now pause when asked to sponsor a woman or take on a service position. I check my motives and pray about what God's will is for me. I understand that if I don't take on every request asked of me I'm not going to get drunk and that others will have the opportunity to be of service. I realize that God is huge and he seems to be taking care of AA just fine and that my part is to not drink, connect with God, go to meetings, and pause when agitated or doubtful. I've been given the gift of becoming right-sized in my world. This thing really works if I just get out of the way and let God be in charge. Imagine that.

Hand in Hand

I can't even guess how far one hand can reach. Across three centuries? Around the globe? Inside a broken heart? Yes, yes, and yes! And then where?

The tiny hand of the newborn that wrapped itself around his mother's finger in 1895 belonged to the infant Bill W., one more cryin' little child in Vermont? But who knew where and how that same hand would reach out to change the lives of millions?

When my own hand reached for the door of the AA room in Ohio in 1970, I had no idea that the door had been unlocked by Bill. All those noisy people sitting under a cloud of smoke were more frightening than a lonely bar at midnight. But the hand of AA was there to welcome me.

Five years later, still sober, I stood on a street corner in Arizona feeling alone and hopeless one more time. By then I had a notion whose hand had written ". . .the alcoholic is an extreme example of self-will run riot. . .we must be rid of this selfishness. . .we must or it kills us." The energy of that hand walked me through my first experience with total surrender.

At twenty-five years sober I received a letter from an ex-railroader in Australia I had met through a meeting-by-mail. My heart was aching over my alcoholic son and he wrote the perfect words to bring life back into focus. I was lifted up by a man down under. What a program!

Last year I spoke at a meeting in Florida that I learned about from a recovering woman in New York City, via the internet. It just gets better! When anyone, anywhere reaches out, the hand of AA is always there. I have received many gifts from hands and hearts guided by the words penned by Bill W.

Whaddyathink? Fast forward--2022. On TV sets around the world we watch as they deliver the first settlers to an interstellar community on another planet. As the spaceship sets down and the settlers cautiously step into the unknown we notice a sticker beside the steps that reads, "Bleep if you know Bill W."
