Showing Up

ust 59 days have come and gone since I made the decision to stop drinking and bawled, tail between my legs, my way to my first AA meeting. It's safe to say my sobriety is still in its infancy, and while my emotions often read like a sine wave from hour to hour, I must be gracious enough with myself to admit to some profound positive shifts in my thinking and ability to cope. These I owe to the miraculous rooms of AA, the wise people who fill them, and a higher power with whom I'm still getting acquainted.

I sat recently for a whole day in the ER with my mother looking for answers regarding several persistent and disconcerting symptoms she's been having. Cancer has devastated our family and remains an ominous spectre to obsess over in this alcoholic's mind. It features prominently in the 'fears' column of my step 4 inventory, and yet given my mother's symptoms is a very real possibility. Frightening indeed.

Step 9: Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.

Amends are more than apologies

Addiction creates moral wreckage. People who become addicted to alcohol or other drugs might lie, cheat, or steal in order to get and use their chemical of choice. Often what's left behind is a trail of shattered relationships. In this situation, apologies won't do. Alcoholics Anonymous calls for amends instead. These are mentioned specifically in Steps Eight and Nine of Alcoholics Anonymous:

Step Eight: Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.

Step Nine: Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.

Amends are first of all an attempt at restitution. Instead of making apologies, this is "making right the wrongs." "An amend has to do with restoring justice as much as possible," says John MacDougall, D.Min., director of Spiritual Guidance for Hazelden Adult Services in Center City. "The idea is to restore in a direct

way that which we have broken or damaged--or to make restoration in a symbolic way if we can't do it directly."

MacDougall offers a simple example: "Say that I borrowed 20 dollars from you and never paid you back. If I go up to you and say, 'Gee, I'm sorry I borrowed your 20 dollars and spent it on drugs,' that would be an apology. Making amends is giving your money back."

Whether our amends are direct or indirect, our aim is avoiding further harm to people. This calls for great sensitivity and guidance from a sponsor.

"The best amends are to make restoration wherever it's possible and then to live differently so that we're not accumulating fresh insults," MacDougall says. "Sometimes the damage can't be repaired in a single action. A lot of amends can only be a accomplished through continued right living each day."

have sent me into a cuticle-gnawing,
panic-inducing tearful frenzy. This would,
of course, be followed shortly by a
wicked bender, and a Guinness-bookworthy hangover, complete with my own
personal pity party on the unfairness of
life. All of this would have left me
virtually useless in the situation.

Instead, I was able to pray to a hodge podge higher power of whom I still have only the vaguest conception for the grace and courage to deal with whatever outcome we faced, sans booze. I found myself utilizing the tools given so freely to me in AA to be aware and present for my mother — still mired in fear and uncertainty — but comforted by the knowledge that I didn't need to drink no matter the verdict.

We're still waiting for answers, but in the meantime I'm staying sober, and surrendering to the process.
