t was just an average day at the store. The usual mix of people looking to alter their current state of mind for whatever reason. The funny thing is I can relate to each and every one of them. Maybe this is why I enjoy working there as much as I do. It helps me witness my disease in its various phases progressing to the point where I needed to ask for help. I know I'm alcoholic because I used to look at altering my state of mind on a daily basis. Any feeling or emotion was good reason to drink. Alcohol would intensify whatever mood I was in. If I was angry, I'd get angrier; if I was sad, I'd get sadder; if I was confused, I'd get even more confused and if I was already happy, Yeeeee Ha...

I know I'm alcoholic because to me alcohol wasn't the problem alcohol was the answer. No matter the situation no matter whom with, whether it is my wife, boss, teammates, neighbor or the guy in the car next to me it didn't matter. If I had a problem with any of them alcohol always came to solve that problem. A couple of drinks and the issues didn't matter any more. Alcohol was the answer and it seemed to work every time...

I know I'm alcoholic because I could have really important things to do and stop for one drink to calm my nerves. Then find myself the next morning wondering how much damage I did. Hoping to be able to mend a business relation or hoping my wife isn't too upset. Hoping I still have the mortgage payment and hoping I didn't wreck the car.

and the drink takes me. Once I have taken that first drink I'm done and you know what, I don't care.

I know I'm alcoholic because I thought about alcohol every single day and I still think about alcohol every single day.

I am fortunate that I didn't lose my house, my job, my wife, my car or anything material. What I was losing was my mind. My demons and the circles of insanity kept spinning getting bigger and bigger and crazier and crazier until finally one day in early December I asked for help. I prayed, asking God for some relief from the madness I had woven into my day-to-day life. I made a decision to stop drinking and then I made a phone call. I called a man I knew was in the program, a man I trusted and a man I respected. We talked until I lost the signal but what I got from that conversation was hope, courage and the desire to finish that day without alcohol.


I haven't had a drink since and I wont have one today but, I can say that I still think about alcohol everyday. I face my demons head on with an unrelenting push. My demons are relentless so I have to be relentless. I have to take the tools of recovery, the basic outline from the Big Book and the fundamental principals of the program and weave these into my day-to-day living so that I can keep my demons at bay. I think about alcohol everyday but not when and where to use it. I think about alcohol everyday to keep it from using me.

I take a short amount of time every morning to reflect on the day before, outline the day I'm in and prepare for the day to come. I journal, I go to meetings, I get involved with my home group, I'm in touch with at least one other alcoholic every single day and I pray.

The fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous is a powerful tool that can be utilized in everyone's life at many different levels. The fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous saved my life and I know now, more than ever, that we must hang together lest we die alone.
