#### Give It Away to Keep It



I had the privilege to interview a woman with 26 years of sobriety.

#### What it was:

Robin says her life had always revolved around alcohol. She would sneak it from her parents' liquor cabinet. Then she found people to buy it for her. The intensity of her alcoholism grew after her family moved from Ohio to the small community of Falcon, CO. Eventually, she would "shoot" a six pack before school. Robin became rebellious and she often ran away from home to stay with her friends. "I used them, stole from them."At one point, she was picked up by the police and chose to go to "juvie" for 10 days instead of going home and following her parents' rules. She was released with one year probation.

Fearful about getting treated right, I want to control what is going on within reality. To get my way, I manipulate using tone of voice to intimidate people into doing things my way. More viscous acts of control drama dictate selfish realities. I am no welcome sight at home, school or work.

Resurfacing thoughts from past action dictate current realities within life. I become afraid of people and life. Acting makes this fear obvious to others within exchanges. Fearful attitudes then create more issues. I blame people I burden with these frightening behaviors for resulting problems.

Change leaves people with similar results every time. Regret, shame and guilt are what these unfortunate victims feel. Resentment is the emotional state that develops. These are the people who made my jerk list. Reality is, I am the only one deserving of the jerk list.

Action naturally evolves from love within the heart. Love consistently brings forth enlightening feelings within a happy emotional state. Respect is earned. It becomes my intent to learn and contribute this way from here onward. People previously upon the jerk list now appear upon my amends list. People I now treat with loving respect escape both lists. Here is our amazing legacy -- right between Wilder & Steinbeck! Just in case you hadn't had time to look it up, here is what the Library of Congress: "88 Most Influential Books" says and a link to the rest of the list:

-- Thornton Wilder, "Our Town: A Play" (1938). Winner of the 1938 Pulitzer Prize, "Our Town" is among the most-performed plays of the 20th century. Those who see it relate immediately to its universal themes of the importance of everyday occurrences, relationships among friends and family and an appreciation of the brevity of life.

-- "Alcoholics Anonymous" (1939). The famous 12-step program for stopping an addiction has sold more than 30 million copies. Millions of men and women worldwide have turned to the program co-founded by Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob Smith to recover from alcoholism. The "Big Book," as it is known, spawned similar programs for other forms of addiction.

-- John Steinbeck, "The Grapes of Wrath" (1939). Few novels can claim that their message led to actual legislation, but "The Grapes of Wrath" did just that. Its story of the travails of Oklahoma migrants during the Great Depression ignited a movement in Congress to pass laws benefiting farmworkers. When Steinbeck won the Nobel Prize in 1962, the committee specifically cited this novel as one of the main reasons for the award.


At 16, she dropped out of high school and went back to Ohio. She married and began working in a liquor store, where they ran a tab to obtain alcohol. Her husband was abusive and she moved back to Colorado Springs. Once more, she married an abusive man. She became pregnant and carried the baby to term although she hadn't changed her lifestyle. She weighed less when delivering than she did when she became pregnant.

Later, Robin went into a treatment program to "get folks off my back. I sobered up and went 'back out'" after a week of leaving the facility. She moved, continued to drink and get involved with other men, her second addiction.

Throughout all of this, she says, the "Grace of God removed me from situations that could have led to my death," referring to the many times she placed herself in danger while drunk.

#### What happened:

"My last drunk scared the hell out of me." She was stood-up by a man and called her ex-husband over to play poker with her and a couple of friends. They were drinking heavily and Robin was taking antabuse at the time (alcohol and antabuse together can cause immediate and severe medical problems, including death). During the game, she blacked out. No one could wake her. She believes she should have been taken to the hospital, but roommate took care of her instead. Her roommate also took care of Robin's daughter who witnessed the entire evening.



Robin called her sponsor and asked for a ride to a meeting. Her sponsor put the responsibility on her to get to the meeting and into the door herself. She did, and found her sponsor waiting for her as she'd promised. She attended 90 meetings in 90 days and continued to call her sponsor for motivation.

#### What it is now:

Currently, Robin is married to a man who was there during and after her completion of the Steps. Their love progressed like a campfire growing from spark. A.A. grew like this for her as well. She is the current manager of the A.A. Service Office and said, "Working here brought me back to the front lines."

When she fully embraced A.A.'s Steps and Traditions, she began to know she is, "being useful to God and others." Robin says she must

> continue to work the program to reinforce the *removal* of the obsession for alcohol. She thinks through every impulse to drink – from start to the ultimate conclusion and consequences. With a sober, clear mind, she can resist and move forward.

Robin attends at least two meetings each week, knowing A.A. and ALANON meetings, and her service work are not replaced by her position at the Service Center.

Her daily routine includes several prayers in the morning and evening meditations with the  $11^{th}$  Step.

Her favorite quote is, "Thy will not mine be done."

Robin's advice to others is, "Don't get complacent or stray too far from the program."



**Concept 8**: The trustees are the principal planners and administrators of overall policy and finance. They have custodial oversight of the separately incorporated and constantly active services, exercising this through their ability to elect all the directors of these entities.



Step 8: Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.

Tradition 8: Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.



### Such special services may be well recompensed. But our usual A.A. "12th Step" work is never to be paid for.

#### TRADITIONS CHECKLIST Tradition Eight

1) Is my own behavior accurately described by the Traditions? If not, what needs changing?

2) When I chafe about any particular Tradition, do I realize how it affects others?

3) Do I sometimes try to get some reward – even if not money – for my personal AA efforts?

4) Do I try to sound in AA like an expert on alcoholism? On recovery? On medicine? On sociology? On AA itself? On psychology? On spiritual matters? Or, heaven help me, even on humility?

5) Do I make an effort to understand what AA employees do? What workers in other alcoholism agencies do? Can I distinguish clearly among them?

6) In my own AA life, have I any experiences which illustrate the wisdom of this Tradition.

7) Have I paid enough attention to the book Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions? To the pamphlet AA Tradition – How It Developed?

## Nightwatch Night Owls News



I am pleased to bring you big news in our program! As of September 1, 2012, the Night Owls are launching project E.A.S.E., which stands for Elimination of the <u>Answering</u> <u>Service</u> <u>Experiment</u>. Currently and for a very long time, we have had an answering service in place to help us answer calls to the Service Office after business hours and on weekends. What we want to do is bring back the old way of doing things, one alcoholic talking to another alcoholic. Why shouldn't we step up to our responsibility, as recovering alcoholics, and let our hands be the one to reach out to those still sick and suffering? Not to mention, it will save a considerable amount of money in our budget that could be used for other things. We will start out slowly, ease into the transition, try out a couple of scattered days of the week for a couple of months and go from there. From the first of September until the end of December will be an experimental period for us to work out any problems that arise and to gather intelligence. This is a chance for us to possibly make a difference in the way the calls are handled after the Service Office is closed. We want to insure that all alcoholics who call us for help get the individual service and utmost care they deserve. We do not take this process lightly nor do we think it will be easy to accomplish. This will be a learning experience for us all and we appreciate any questions, concerns, or comments from our A.A. community.

**Calling all Night Owls! Hoot! Hoot!** If you are already a volunteer for Nightwatch and you want to express your opinion or have your voice heard about this or any other issue, I invite you to come to the monthly meetings. The meetings are held at The Peer, located at 308-I South 8<sup>th</sup> Street, behind La Casita, every first Tuesday of the month at 7pm. We are also providing Night Owl training sessions at the meetings. If you have six months of continuous sobriety and are ready to enter the exciting and rewarding world of service work, you are welcome to join us at our meetings to learn more about this service committee.

**Night Owl Words of Wisdom:** Practical Experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics. It works when other activities fail. This is our twelfth suggestion: Carry this message to other alcoholics! You can help when no one else can. You can secure their confidence when others fail. Remember they are very ill.
