

I am an alcoholic. These words

were the first words I ever uttered that were honest and the first ounce of humility that I ever felt in my life. I am the type of alcoholic who lost almost everything.

My journey with alcohol truly began at the age of 18. I had tried alcohol many times before this, but

this would be what I call my blackout era. For many years, I allowed for alcohol to be the master, the king, the emperor in my life. It made me feel free as if I could conquer the world as long as I had a bottle. The years progressed, and

hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy


TRADITION 10 CHECKLIST:

- 3. What in AA history gave rise to our Tenth Tradition?
- 4. Have I had a similar experience in my own AA life?
- 5. What would AA be without this Tradition? Where would I be?
- 6. Do I breach this or any of its supporting Traditions in subtle, perhaps unconscious, ways?
- 7. How can I manifest the spirit of this Tradition in my personal life outside AA? Inside AA? And bylaws?

Sponsor: Check your motives

When I first came in to the program, I thought honesty was being honest when talking with someone. Now I realize honesty is also within myself. To be totally honest with myself, I now check my motives when I do something, such as when and why I go to a particular meeting. What is my motive for going?

I never thought I could be a 13th-stepper, but I found out how easy it is. It messed with my head and my serenity. I couldn't figure out what was wrong with me. But then I realized I had fallen for a newcomer.

I spent all my time trying to get him to like me and thinking of ways to be with him, like going to meetings he went to. I never put his sobriety ahead of my feelings. It was all about me! But I didn't see

then how destructive it was for him. building my self-esteem and chang-Not only did it test my sobriety it tested my integrity.

It doesn't say anywhere in the big book about this, but it's important since it has taken almost three years and a new sponsor to realize the wrong I was doing and how my motives were not that of my higher power. I wasn't living in the program. I now realize that to grow and become spiritually fit, the program *must* come first.

Needless to say, being single is not easy for me.

So today living in the program and putting my sobriety in my higher power's hands, working closely with my sponsor on the sex inventory, finding the unhealthy ways I dealt with romantic and friend relationships, I have begun to work on

ing my thinking on how healthy relationships work.

Today I know when my higher power feels I should be in a relationship. When that happens, I will be ready. But until then, I'm working on being a friend to all people, including the fellow I once chased.

I know now I must share my strength, experience and hope that I have learned from my sponsor.

What a difference now that my motive is to build up the program and help others to realize spiritual fitness is more important. I am growing in the program and my spiritual awareness is more important to me. I am so blessed to have been given such a wonderful sponsor who is strict but loving.

My mother twice gave me the gift of life

my best friend was not so kind.

I always say my mother gave me the gift of life twice. After many attempts at trying to "slow down" or "swear off the hard stuff for good," my mother 12th-stepped me when I was 24. I am what they call a "go see if you are truly alcoholic" type of gal. I had many failed attempts at trying to stay sober

I became sober only for important events or when fear of jails, homelessness, or losing my relationships with others kicked in. For seven years, I battled this disease, thinking that I knew better and never truly allowing for anyone to see how dark my life had become.

The year 2015 rolled around. I was married. A man, I thought, would solve all of my problems.

We had a beautiful daughter in addition to the son I raked through my alcoholic destruction. My father passed away. The biggest gift my father gave to me was the realization that I could not live a life based intensity, things I could not control solely on alcohol.

Unfortunately, after he died, the worst of my disease had yet to come. In less than a year, I lost custody of my children to DHS, lost the respect of my family members, and almost lost my nursing career. It was time that I finally accept reality and die. This was my last thought on my last day drunk. I clearly remember uttering, "Please help me. I need treatment, I need help."

I was fortunate. I went to treatment. Once finished with treatment, I came to Colorado Springs. I found a sponsor who I call "my OG" be-

cause she keeps me in line. Each step gave me more freedom than the last as she called me out on my "thinking."

As I worked this program with started happening. I experienced a lot of death ... and a lot of rejoicing. I have a life today that I could never have dreamed:

I have maintained the job of my choice; I have regained custody of my children; I no longer have judicial issues; and I am regaining my self-worth.

I see now that my disease was never just about my drinking, but about my thinking.

As each day passes, I glimpse back to the shell I used to be, and I thank my higher power for changing who I am.
