Came to, then came to believe...

The path to finding a Higher Power

I know that many folks come into the program with a very limited belief in a Higher Power or are very disappointed in the God of their understanding.

Many others don't believe in a Higher Power.

I have been up and down with my Higher Power. I have been rock bottom and at times have felt abandoned by my Higher Power. I've had moments when I felt like my Higher Power had me by the scruff of the

neck helping me along in my rocky days. Then there are times in my life when I just felt at peace.

I suspect I am not alone.

The last night I drank I heard a still, quiet voice in my head that said, "Why don't you stop drinking?" For some reason that night I heard or felt the power of that question. I asked myself, "Why am I putting myself through this endless cycle of sad, sick, and sorry?"

I am sure it was my Higher Power

that night in the dark with me.

The insanity for me was repeating the same things over and over. I will not drink today. I will not drink tonight. At 5 o'clock I was glass in hand having a "happy hour" that turned into misery during the night and me swearing I won't do that again.

That was my insanity!
I have realized that my Higher

AA is everywhere — go experience it!

The great beauty of Alcoholics Anonymous is that you can find it in any state, most cities, and every region in the United States! (For that matter, it's made its way throughout the globe ... but that's another story!)

I truly miss my Colorado communities of AA when I'm not there, but I have enjoyed the groups in the panhandle of Texas, Florida, and in Central Louisiana (Alexandria and surrounding areas). AA is the same friendly, spiritual source of strength, hope, and experience everywhere I go, yet the regional flavor is something, though, to be appreciated.

In Alexandria I quickly noticed some interesting special differences, or flavors, in the AA experience. Bill Wilson noticed that some groups did more helping-talk

with members that had troubles or questions about their sobriety. This is considered cross-talk in many modern groups, yet is not clearly spelled out in the traditions and practices.

In Louisiana I have noticed much more supportive cross-talk than I remember in Colorado. I have also noticed a seemingly significantly higher number of new AA members on a weekly basis (65 folks at a regular Tuesday night meeting I first attended). There are also a larger proportion of NA members in the AA groups. New members seem to talk more than in Colorado. This seems to be both helpful as well as a little out of order from the traditions. Louisiana may be an example of how

Step Two, finding a Higher Power

Step two, "Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to Sanity," sounded great to me when I came in the rooms in 2012. But was this something that actually could happen for my life?

I came into AA believing in God, but I was super angry with Him and didn't think I could rely on Him to give me a freedom I would never know. I remember thinking this step would be

somewhat easy, but I couldn't fully think He could take away all my insecurities.

When I started working a set of steps with my first sponsor, I remember how long she really wanted to drive into my head all of the times I made decisions on my own and what the outcomes were. We looked at my whole life, before and during my drinking career, and that let me see the damage I caused and the insane acts I had done to try to seem "normal."

When I was able to see all this on paper with my own handwriting, I was so scared of myself I didn't know what to do!

Thank God the second step was next. That let me know I am not powerful (nor did I want to be anymore) and all I needed to know was that there is someone else that *WAS* powerful ... and not another human being, either! This step has definitely been a rollercoaster in my life. I tend to forget some days that I am not the one in charge. Recently, with service work and being a new



mom (sweet girl is six months!) I have struggled with thinking that my decisions are best, and if everyone would just show up like they **should**, everything would be great! Ha, no!

My plans are not the greatest

What usually happens is I show up so mad to life without anything happening, and my inventory has 32 people on resentments

at six years of sobriety! This is **NOT** how I thought sobriety would look like at six years. I thought I would be someone who smiled at everyone, and my life would be so wonderful I would truly know peace! But it has been work, work that I must keep striving for with my sponsor and God.

I have to go back to step one and see how much my life is still unmanageable. I need to see how powerless I am, to truly know how God is more powerful than I am, and when I align my life with his plans, life is more peaceful!

This program is so silly, because it is truly simple, I just like to complicate everything! So, just for today, I will trust God will restore me to sanity, and that I just need to step out of his way!

I'm so grateful for this program being in my life, and I never thought I would be saying that six years ago when I decided alcohol is not the solution any more.

- Do I have to save face in group discussion, or can I yield in good spirit to the group conscience and work cheerfully along with it?
- Although I have been sober a few years, am I willing to serve my turn at AA chores?
- In group discussions, do I sound off about matters on which I have no experience and little knowledge?


Food & AA: Best combination

AA adjusts to regional differences, while still maintaining its original structure and design.

A new group developed in Alexandria that is a throwback closed meeting following the original traditions of AA. Old-timers and only-Alcoholics are included. Many large groups open their doors to new members that may not follow the original order in which new folks listen more and speak less.


Off the record a little ... An interesting analogy in Louisiana can be made between local convenience stores and different AA groups. Almost every local convenience store (not to include franchise stores), has its own brand of specialty fried foods unique to Louisiana. You can get fried catfish, chicken, meat pies, shrimp, and even fried pork chops (among many other choices) at these small locations. In the AA groups there is a unique "flavor" to each meeting's personality. Each open, book-study, principals, or speaker meeting has its own character.

Overall, the meetings I have attended whether in Colorado, Texas, Louisiana, or Florida have all had the basic core traditions and routines intact. The beauty of AA is how it seems to travel so well to different states and regions in this country. I have also attended meetings that were not identified as AA, yet promoted their own brand of recovery from addiction. These groups seem well-intentioned, yet seem to fall short, in my mind, to achieve the AA goals. AA has long-tested practices, and well-documented success. It just seems to me that if it's not broken, don't try to fix it. Keeping it simple does seem to be the guiding principle that has kept AA moving forward and expanding for nearly ninety years.

My latest travels have brought me to Florida. AA here, as might be expected, is a little older-age heavy. This brings lots of experience, tradition, and life-changing insights. For some reason, Florida seems a little less newmember friendly. It might just be me, but Florida in general seems more eclectic as it is composed of so many folks from so many states and countries. Treats at meetings here are common and popular. There also seems to be many different kinds of meetings here as well.

I visited a few AA meetings in the panhandle of Texas. Even very small towns have several meetings available to the locals at different times. Texas included many local ethnic flavors in its AA offerings, as well as a nice cross-section of ages and lifestyles. Texans are notoriously independent in how they take responsibility for their lives, as well as pride in their state.

I guess my message is ... when you travel, treat your-



self to the regional versions of AA you most certainly will find.

There are often local websites that give the time, place (directions), and purpose of the local meetings. AA truly is far and wide, yet local and personal!
