Cooperation with Professional Communities (CPC) Workshop Re-Cap

The CPC Workshop took place at the downtown group space on Saturday Oct. 24 at 1:30pm. It was a pretty good turn-out with about 35 people. There was a pot-luck with a pretty good spread of food. We got down to business at around 2pm. The panel consisted of 5 people; Joey, Larry, Andrew, Nalene, and Joyce. Also the PI chair, Jack, rounded us off. The PI committee and CPC committee work very closely together so that the CPC committee speaks and works with the teachers, Parole Officer's, and Officers of the military. The PI committee works with the students, inmates, and soldiers.

Larry started us off by going over exactly what CPC or other volunteers should be talking to the professional communities about, regarding AA. Some of the questions we would need to answer are.... "What is AA?" "Where did AA start?" "How can you find AA?" When answering these questions and speaking to these people, the main and basic thing we need to remember is to stick to the traditions. We need to detach from our personal beliefs and opinions and just let them know who we are and what we do and don't do. He also brought up the fact that there are around 82 groups registered in this area and 2 people showed up for the last committee meeting.

Joey went over some of the numerical facts from the American Medical Association (AMA). In 2008 it was reported that an estimated 17,500,000 people drink alcoholically in the US. There are 295 million people in the US, so around 17% of our population. However, there are only 1.2 million members in AA in the US. So, 7% of people that drink alcoholically are in AA. That leaves 93% (16,300,000 people) that have either other resources or none at all.

Andrew, along with the committee, has been working with the Manitou Springs High School to help the faculty and staff members reach out to their students. The committee was able to go in and share their experience, strength, and hope with the staff and answer questions. From this, the committee has set up several 12-step calls for the students and has been able to show them that we're the solution, not the sentence. The committee has also recently gotten a call from the faculty regarding getting this out to other high schools. They want to cooperate and help us branch out which means that we need more volunteers on the AA side to participate and help get this up and running.

The CPC committee has recently been going to Ft. Carson to work with soldiers and speak to them about AA. Melissa, someone from one of the groups on Ft. Carson, shared a personal story about a newcomer coming into the meeting shortly after the CPC/Ft. Carson workshop. He came into the meeting and said that after hearing the committee talk he began wondering why he drank the way he did. He also tried going to the bar and drinking one drink in an hour and that very quickly turned into 15 drinks. The newcomer and his friend both left with a big book and these people might not come back to the meeting but the seed was planted. This is proof that what the CPC committee is doing is working in some way.

The rest of the workshop was spent going over the questions in the "How AA Members Cooperate with Professionals" Pamphlet. There were some questions read aloud and different participants in the workshop answered with their own personal accounts or answers. Some other pamphlets available that are very informative when getting involved with the CPC or PI committees or volunteering to speak to other outside entities are "Speaking at Non-A.A. Meetings", "A.A. at a glance", and "Information on Alcoholics Anonymous". Also available that is a very great pamphlet is "A.A. in the Armed Services". All of these pamphlets might be available at your home group and if not, can be found at the Service Office.

This was a very informative workshop and a lot of fun. I recommend stopping by one of the CPC committee meetings which are the 1st Saturday of every month at 9am at the Downtown Group (the November meeting is the 2nd Saturday). If you're interested in getting involved with any other committee their meeting times and locations are located on the front of the meeting schedule and online.

I just made my first Twelfth Step call. A year ago, I gave my number to a guy named Mike. He called me and said he had slipped again. He had been drinking that morning, he said.

I asked him if he wanted to go for coffee and talk. He couldn't go outside, he said, because he looked like a celebrity mug shot. Could I bring coffee to him? I asked. Would he mind if my sponsor and I dropped by his house?

When we arrived, Mike was waiting for us outside. He was a little shaky and still a little drunk. But he lit up when he saw us--I mean, really lit up. I had only met him a few times, but he said my name like he had known me all his life.

"Alex!" He rushed toward us with an excited smile on his face. "Alex! Oh my God, Alex, look at you! Alex, you look so good!" He hugged me, held on to me, and kept saying how good! looked, over and over again.

We went into his kitchen with the coffee. My sponsor did most of the talking. Ralph loves to talk and I was glad, because I had no idea what to say.

As my sponsor talked, Mike kept turning to look at me. I couldn't place his look. It was weird and, in another context, might have been creepy. Ralph kept talking. Mike kept staring.

Finally, Mike said something about how kind I was. He talked about how I kept calling him over the months. When he hugged me again, an emotional dam seemed to break inside of him. He crumbled in my arms and cried. It wasn't just his eyes that cried; it was his whole body. I held him.

We stayed for a couple of hours. Finally, I had to go--I was late for an appointment. Ralph decided to stay with Mike.

Although Ralph is blind, and Mike didn't have a car, I knew they would get to a meeting, and Ralph would get home just fine. I had no idea how, and neither did Ralph, but they would. That seems to be how the program works for us.

As I drove to my appointment, I thought about the look on Mike's face. Finally, realization dawned on me.

Hope.


Something about my showing up with Ralph gave Mike hope. From the pit of despair, he looked up and caught a quick peek at a better tomorrow.

My own glimpse of an incredibly powerful and good spiritual force struck me with awe. Because that morning, less than an hour before Mike called, I did something I hadn't done in a while. I dropped to my knees and asked a God I didn't understand for knowledge of his will for me, and the strength to carry that out.

- 4. Am I ashamed of being a recovered, or recovering alcoholic?
- 5. What would AA be like if we were not guided by the ideas in Tradition Eleven?
- 6. Is my AA sobriety attractive enough that a sick drunk would want such a quality for himself or herself?

A Thanksgiving Blessing

This past Thanksgiving Day I was alone. I was divorced, single, and it was my ex's turn to enjoy the kids for the day. I had many invitations to spend the day with friends and family, but I decided to treat myself to a "Spring Day." Here in Missouri there are many springs and most of them are in the Current River Country. So, Thursday morning I loaded up, and with my trusty companion--my dog, Deacon--headed south toward our first spring. It was a delightful day; sunny and not cold, but not warm either. (It's been a warmer than usual fall here in Missouri.) We spent the day traveling further south from spring to spring: first Meramec and then Montauk, Welch, Round Spring, and finally we turned back north after Blue Spring.

My home group is in Leslie, Missouri, and meets at 8:00 P.M. I knew that at 3:30 in the afternoon I would have to head back north no matter where I was, if I wanted to make the meeting. Once I hit the Interstate after dark, I realized I was hungry, so I started looking for a place to eat. I ended up stopping at a big truck stop and it was crowded. If you can help it, a truck stop is not the place to spend Thanksgiving dinner--or maybe it is.

I looked around for a place to sit, but every table or booth was either occupied or had a pile of unappealing dirty dishes. I picked out a booth with dishes and sat down, hoping to catch the waitress's eye. Well, that took a fair amount of time as there was hardly anyone working. Finally, she came over and we talked as she picked up the dishes and left me a wet cloth to wipe off the table. It seems that most of the regular workers had the day off to spend with their families, and the remaining staff was swamped with customers. Anyway, I finished cleaning off the table and got up to head over to the buffet. I walked about ten feet and thought about going back to the booth and leaving my hat as a sign that it was occupied, but I didn't.

After I had fixed my plate and started back to my booth, I noticed I was following an older man and he was headed right toward my booth. Well, you know about Step Ten "and when we were wrong promptly admitted it." I believe the opposite is also true--that when we are right, we don't have to promptly say so. With that thought in mind, I asked this older gentleman if he was dining alone (he was) and if he would mind if I joined him (he didn't). As I thanked him, introduced myself, and sat down, I noticed the folks at the two nearest tables smiling at what had just happened. At first sight, they saw the older man with coat and tie joined by a younger man with long hair and a beard (obviously different) plus they had seen me clean and organize the table.

Before we settled in to eat, he (whose name I now knew was Bud) asked if he could bless the meal. I couldn't have been more pleased to say yes as I bowed my head. We had a delightful meal talking about life and spiritual matters.

As I was driving, I couldn't help but think about the gifts I've received as a result of trying to practice these principles in all of my affairs. I could have pointed out to the gentleman that it was my booth: I had cleaned it, and I was going to eat there--alone. Instead the AA magic worked on me (without my realizing it at the time) and allowed me to receive the gift of humanity and friendship from a stranger. As a result of getting and staying sober, I have received many blessings; some I know and some I don't.
