I suspect I am not alone. The last night I drank I heard a still quiet voice in my head that said, "Why don't you stop drinking?" For some reason that night I heard or felt the power of that question. I asked myself, "why am I putting myself through this endless cycle of sad, sick and sorry"?

I am sure it was my Higher Power that night in the dark with me. The insanity for me was repeating the same things over and over. I will not drink today. I will not drink tonight. At 5 o'clock I was glass in hand having a "happy hour" that turned into misery during the night and me swearing I won't do that again. That was my insanity!

I have realized that my Higher Power is in and around everything I do. In a perfect world in every decision I make, you would think I would quiet down and listen to the still small voice of

my Higher Power. No, when I get overcome by ego, overcome by fear, the voice of my Higher Power gets farther away.

To keep connected to my Higher Power I am constantly "reigning" myself in. I must take time every day to read my 24 hour book and the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous. I also keep a journal that helps me to get my thoughts out of my head and onto paper.

For me, AA is a spiritual program. I tried sobriety on my own without my Higher Power and it just didn't work. When I do the right things to connect to my Higher Power the results are amazing and not my doing! The 12 steps are spiritually inspired and if I follow them I am sure to have some success in my life and with my sobriety.

Things will not always be perfect but they may be a bit easier with the help of a Higher Power.



- 6. Why doesn't every AA group need a constitution and bylaws?
- 7. Have I learned to step out of an AA job gracefully– and profit thereby-when the time comes?
- 8. What has rotation to do with anonymity? With humility?
