~ COPPERS ~

I managed to put together two years in the Fellowship by the time I promoted to patrol sergeant in a major city police department.

My first assignment was in a very high crime division; one that everyday had more shooting calls, murders and robberies than most medium sized police department in a month, if not a year.

The coppers that work this division were there because they wanted to be, all of us thought of ourselves as "gunfighters."

Each sergeant was directly responsible for eight to ten officers in addition to supervising all the coppers during the watch.

My first meeting with these officers was a critical one. This is where they learn their new sergeant's like and dislikes.

I began with a warning: "Don't ever let me catch you letting an off-duty police officer you suspect of DUI go." I added, "I'll make your life a nightmare."

The look on their faces registered their upset: they were pissed! After all, cops always take care of other cops or so goes the belief.

I told these men and women that I was let go too many time to recount when I stopped for driving drunk. All these officers did was allow me the opportunity to kill myself or Heaven forbid some innocent person. The worst that ever happen: state patrol officers threw my keys into the ivy growing on the side of the freeway. I supposed they thought I'd sober up by the time I found my keys; I didn't.

Had the officers done their job, I may have made it to our Fellowship much earlier than I did.

When I explained there, was no difference between taking a bullet to protect your partner and recognizing an officer is abusing alcohol—drinking and driving (a big clue), that they taking action, tell a supervisor who will make the decision to arrest the driver.

There is no way to find out if my experience had an impact of these coppers, but what I can say is the incidence of coppers being arrested for driving under the influence has diminished since those days long ago. Thank God.



Nightwatch Night Owls News



Happy February! I would like to share with you a call that I received on Nightwatch in January. Let me set the stage for you; I was at home watching television and my phone rang. Knowing that I was on shift for the hotline, I had my Nightwatch information packet handy and a meeting schedule just a click away on the home computer. I answered the phone and here is how the conversation went:

{Night Owl} Hello, this is Gina.

{Caller} Hi, my name is Kari, have I reached the right number? I am trying to reach someone about going to a meeting or something, I don't know. This is the fifth number I have called and I was ready to just give up trying to find the correct place. It took everything I had to start calling for help but then I couldn't find the right number. Another place I called gave me this number for Alcoholics Anonymous. I am just so glad someone answered, thank you, what was your name again?

{Night Owl} My name is Gina, and yes, you have reached the correct number. I am a volunteer for Alcoholics Anonymous and I can certainly give you meeting information. Can you tell me what part of town you are in?

{Caller} I am in the 80918 area of Colorado Springs. I am not sure if I am an alcoholic but my husband says that I am and need to get some help. Actually, he drinks more than I do but I can only help myself. I need to do this for my kids and for me... I want to do this for me. I work at night and could go to a meeting during the day.

{Night Owl} I know of a meeting place in that area, it should be pretty close to you... (I went on to give her the address and meeting times for the appropriate location.) You can also go to the website address, coloradospringsaa.org, and click on meeting schedules if you would like some different times and places for meetings.

{Caller} What do they do at the meetings?

{Night Owl} There are a lot of great women that go to the meetings. Make sure that you announce your name and that you are new to the meeting and ask for phone numbers of some of the women at the meeting so that you have a few contacts just in case you need to talk to someone between meetings. You can just listen or if you feel comfortable, you can share a little about yourself. If you decide that you are in fact an alcoholic, you should find a female sponsor; begin reading the Alcoholics Anonymous "Big Book" and start working the twelve steps. In my

opinion, only *you* can decide if you are an alcoholic and *you* are the one who has to want help.

{Caller} Thank you so much for talking to me and giving me some information. I will get to one of the meetings.

{Night Owl} You are so welcome. Have a great night.

This is a fairly typical caller situation in Nightwatch. Sometimes they are even more simple calls such as passing on the website so that they may see and choose the meetings for themselves. Other times the caller may not have a vehicle and might need a ride to a meeting, in which case the Night Owl would call a twelfth stepper on our list and give the caller information to the twelfth stepper to assist and carry out the message of Alcoholics Anonymous. If you have six months of continuous sobriety, are willing to commit to a weekly service position for one year, and have a phone, you can volunteer to be a Night Owl. We always need more volunteers for service.






