Appendix VII states, "The Twelve Traditions ensure the unity of the Fellowship." And twice in Appendix 1 unity is spoken about two times in the same few pages (left these two for you to find)!!!! So see yet again, the truth of our lives and futures as recovered and recovering alcoholics is laid out in our text book, and it's in the text book, then we

can count on its truth!

This month the PINT brings you stories of journeys in UNITY in our fellowship, but also UNITY between individuals and their Higher Power and how that provides a foundation for sobriety one day at a time. Without the unconditional positive regard of a closed mouthed, understanding friend, I would have almost certainly perished. Likewise, he without me.

Through taking steps together, we found that our deepest wounds (the wounds that we believed had alienated us from the rest of mankind) were virtually identical. When we became united on this common ground, God commenced to work through us both for our mutual healing.

As time passes, the unity we experience with our sponsors gives us the courage to share openly with others. We gain the esteem required to be our whole self. When others see our old wounds, now nicely healed scars, we pray that they can relate with our experience and say to themselves, "Maybe this program can work for me too."

“Unified Purpose”

Unity has always meant to me working together towards a single purpose. In AA that single purpose is to stay sober and carry the message to the alcoholics that still suffer.

My first voluntary experience with AA was in 1991 when I went to the first meeting that I ever went to by choice. I was 16 years old and I rode my bicycle to the meeting after school ended. I was living in alcoholic misery knowing that I could no longer drink and be confined to live with an alcoholic mind. When I shared I was afraid that I would be dismissed because I was so young. That group ignored the messenger and paid attention to the message. I was an alcoholic and I had no idea how to live without a drink. That unified group loved and welcomed me to the fold.

Over the years I have seen people "who ordinarily do not mix" coming together for the common purpose of carrying the message. When we as an area unify to put on an event like our Alcothon so that the newly sober member may have somewhere safe to go on New Year's we are practicing this principle. When countless members come together to serve food, cook meals, or introduce speakers they are demonstrating this commitment to unity in order to carry our AA message.

It is after all very difficult to separate our three legacies of unity, service and recovery. We unify to serve by carrying the message of recovery.

"Recovery"

As with many of the words or concepts in our program, recovery can have different meanings. For example "re-cover" as in "put a new cover on" or "regain something once lost" or in the most common sense "move from alcoholic insanity to sobriety and recovery." It's not uncommon to hear individuals parse these concepts at meetings: "I'm a recovered alcoholic." "I'm a recovering alcoholic." "I'm sober today and have been granted a daily reprieve dependent on the maintenance of a fit spiritual condition." In my case all three apply.

My new cover is a work in progress. At the beginning of my journey I was covered with fear, insecurity and an unhealthy dependence on people, places and things for the maintenance of fragile self-esteem. My sobriety journey has helped me replace this fearful, insecure, dependent cover with a more realistic cover based in an ability of be open, vulnerable and honest, to the best of my ability, with my fellow humans. A worker among workers, family member among family members, neighbor among neighbors, and a member among members. This is not an overnight event and has obviously taken time and continues to take time. However I do not think it would have been possible without my participation in the recovery process laid out in the 12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous.

When I think about regaining something lost my attention shifts to the Christian hymn Amazing Grace written by the English poet John Newton (1725-1807). I was lost and now am found, blind and now I see, deaf and now I hear. That last part is not in the hymn but is true for me. I was lost in alcoholic insanity and could not see a way out. Friends and family members were speaking to me but my alcoholic defensive insecurity made me unable to hear their words. It wasn't until I heard the words of Larry G. at the Serenity Club and or the words of Bill W. at Walk the Talk or the unmistakable growl of Truman P. suggesting I get in the key-wrecked position that I began to get a glimpse of my true condition. "Frothy emotional appeal seldom suffices. The message which can interest and hold these alcoholic people must have depth and weight."

Today I do not considered myself "recovered" but am in the process of recovery. I get to do that today as a result of benevolent brain washing that has occurred to me over the time I have been in Alcoholics Anonymous, and yes my brain needed a through scrubbing. I have grown to love the concept of "fit spiritual condition." At the beginning of my journey, fit spiritual condition was the last thing on my mind. Today it is foremost in my consciousness, to maintain fit spiritual condition. This recovery concept has become my rudder, my load stone, my North Star, and my direction when all else fails. Working, on living in fit spiritual condition saved me.

ARCHIVES PRESENTS: Circle and Triangle Unity

Dateline: Antiquity to Present

Introduction

The solution to our alcoholism is found within the Three Legacies (Recovery, Unity and Service). Each legacy has twelve guiding spiritual principles. A total of 36 guiding principles. Each of spiritual principles are contained in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous (Recovery, Unity, Service), the Twelve and Twelve (Recovery and Unity), and the General Service Manual (Service). This month we are exploring the "Unity" Legacy.

Dateline: Somewhere in Antiquity

The symbol of the circle and triangle or as it is sometimes called the "Triangle of Manifestation" is rooted in the number three. According to metaphysics, in order to manifest something, three components must come together.¹ The purpose of the Triangle of Manifestation is exactly that-to manifest something. Ceremonial magicians used it to manifest astral beings, but it can also be used to manifest spirit guides, animal totems, healing, prosperity, etc.¹

Dateline: St Louis, 1955

The Circle and Triangle symbol has long been connected to the A.A. Fellowship. It was adopted as an official A.A. symbol at the International Convention in St. Louis in 1955, and from that point on was widely used in the Fellowship. For the Fellowship, the three legs of the triangle represented the Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity and Service, and the circle symbolized the world of A.A. In *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age*, Bill W.'s 1955 speech, in which he describes the adoption of the symbol, is printed.

"The circle stands for the whole world of A.A., and the triangle stands for A.A.'s Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity, and Service. Within our wonderful new world, we have found freedom from our fatal obsession. That we have chosen this particular symbol is perhaps no accident. The priests and seers of antiquity regarded the circle enclosing the triangle as a means of warding off spirits of evil, and A.A.'s circle and triangle of Recovery, Unity, and Service has certainly meant all of that to us and much more." (Bill W., *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age*, Bill W.'s 1955 speech).²

Dateline: Miami, July 1970

A.A. held its 35th Anniversary International Convention in Miami Beach, Florida in July 1970. The theme of the Conference was unity within the Fellowship.

The Unity Declaration reads:

This we owe to A.A.'s future: to place our common welfare first; to keep our Fellowship united. For on A.A. unity depend our lives and the lives of those to come.

The "Unity" statement was read by delegates from different countries on Saturday night during the Unity Ceremony. Below, I have presented brief highlights from that night's ceremony, as led by former General Manager, Bob H.:

"As you know the theme of this Conference is Unity Within Our Fellowship. We have asked several of our ex-delegates and members from overseas to be on stage and participate with us adopting our new Declaration of Unity..."

"A.A. unity is the special quality that makes our Fellowship unique. It is the cement that holds our society together, the platform which makes A.A. 'Service' possible. It is more than agreement on basic principles, more than freedom from destructive strife. It is a bond fashioned of shared experience, such as this one we share tonight."

"Unity is our most precious possession, our best guarantee of A.A.'s future. May we all value and preserve it, today and all the tomorrows to come."³

Dateline: General Service Office, 1993

Metaphysics and copyrights aside, anyone can still use the circle and triangle logo! It's just not the "official" trade mark for Alcoholics Anonymous anymore. So many groups wanted to use the "Circle" for their own emblems that lawyers advised the General Service Board the copyright on the logo was unenforceable.

Dateline: Anywhere, 2015

Our common welfare must come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity. The 12 Traditions apply to the life of the Fellowship itself, guiding AA on how to relate to the world around it, how to live, grow and adapt. These traditions apply also to the individual. One member once remarked that by following the spiritual principles within the traditions she refrained from committing homicide in her home group! She learned to play well with others.

Next month's Pint will present a review of the Recovery Legacy leg, providing 12 more spiritual principles for your toolbox. And, if you are still reading the Pint in August, you will have the opportunity to pick up the remaining 12 guiding principles which surround Service. Why would you want to do this? Why, just last month Cris shared that when she put all 36 into action she blew the doors off her recovery!
