"TRADITION TWO"

When I came back to the program, a day or two ago, I knew what I had to do. I knew I needed to get involved in service, period. So, after I got comfortable in my home group it started. I began attending the group's business meetings and got pulled into the middle of the herd. After a few months, elections came around and I was voluntold to consider alternate Intergroup representative. Next thing I knew, I was attending my first Intergroup meeting. Intergroup needed a vice chair for the Pint and guess what, I raised my hand but, this is another story.

In the meantime at my home group, I was thrust into helping put together our summer picnic. This was an interesting process to be sure, as no one seemed to agree on anything. What park to use, what weekend, what time and what to serve, etc., etc. As I watched this whole thing unfold, I suddenly understood why they started the process four months in advance. I'm pleased to announce the picnic was well attended and a success to spite ourselves.

My service as alternate Intergroup representative seemed short-lived because I became the Intergroup rep. before I was ready, or at least it felt that way. Getting pulled into this herd was a real eye opening experience. I began to see how the fellowship fits together and why nothing in A.A. happens quickly. I began to learn that it's okay to make mistakes. I began to see how the minority opinion is the most important opinion in a group and, I began to understand how the group conscience comes together on decisions that potentially affect us all.

What surprised me, is this same process works loosely in my home group business meetings as well. I use the term loosely, loosely. The best example of a major group decision is the first move I was involved in. Personalities kicking around principles with every emotion on display, making mountains out of molehills all made for a long, sometimes uncomfortable ride. Remarkably, decisions were made and some were popular but some were not. The group service body however, agreed to all of the decisions and, progress was made in the best interest of the group as a whole. This was an amazing process to watch and be a part of, for sure.

All the boards I've been on and all service-oriented meetings I've attended ultimately came to decisions based on the group conscience. It's fascinating to watch God work through individuals and to watch our leaders blossom with the trust given them. Not all of the decisions are good but they somehow seem to work. Not all the good decisions work but they were given a chance. When the minority opinion is heard and sways the vote, decisions are made based on these results. The outcome is almost always far beyond what anyone could have expected or even imagine.

My involvement in service continues to this day. My experience in the traditions continues to grow, as my exposure to the traditions is ongoing, at a divine level, on a need to know basis. When I run face first into any tradition I know there is a lesson in it and, I need to know. Tradition two gains more depth and meaning for me as my efforts in service continue.

Tradition two is practiced at all healthy group, committee, inter-

group, district, area and regional meetings all over the world. Tradition two insures that everyone has a voice in what their group or committee does provided the member makes the effort to attend the meetings where your voices are heard. Tradition two helps weave us all together allowing us to slowly move forward by entertaining all the voices that make up our fellowship, especially the minority voice.

So suit up, show up, listen up and speak up. Your voice is a large part of the group conscience, be heard!



"TRADITION TWO.. SUBSTANCE"

These traditions are the basis for keeping our society united in the one goal of all that are here and all that are yet to come. I once heard in a traditions meeting, that you need them all in order just like the steps. Therefore, if our personal recovery depends upon AA unity, it is the substance of Tradition Two that reminds us all that we are just a small part of a great whole.

Nothing more clearly explains how small my role is in this, than reading the words "For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority — a loving God as he may express Himself in our group conscience". This has been an ever growing staple in my sobriety. The understanding of what it truly means to have love and tolerance for others is shown here. Each and every one of us may express our feelings about any subject presented in the program, but in the end the entire group is the final word. There will always be different ways of doing things, and I just have to know that the group will decide what that is.

The second half of Tradition Two makes it very clear that a rotating leadership is a good thing. "Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern." Any alcoholic who is left with all of the chores of any group will always have a feeling one way or the other of which way to go. Hence, any left for very long might start to lean towards pushing their own agenda and not that of the group. I only sit back now after many years and offer any help, hope or experience if I am asked in my homegroup. I am here for them to just carry a message that has not changed, that was given to me by those who came before me.

There is a line on page 161 in the Big Book that reads... "Being wrecked in the same vessel, being restored and united under one God, with hearts and minds attuned to the welfare of others, the things which matter so much to some people no longer signify much to them." How could they?




CONCEPT 2: The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs.

Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.




TRADITION 2:

Tradition 2:

- 1. Do I criticize or do I trust and support my group officers, AA committees, and office workers? Newcomers? Old-timers?
- 2. Am I absolutely trustworthy, even in secret, with AA Twelfth Step jobs or other AA responsibility?
- 3. Do I look for credit in my AA jobs? Praise for my AA ideas.
- 4. Do I have to save face in group discussion, or can I yield in good spirit to the group conscience and work cheerfully along with it.
- 5. Although I have been sober a few years, am I willing to serve my turn at AA chores?
- 6. In group discussions, do I sound off about matters on which I have no experience and little knowledge?
- 7. Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of the fellowship?
