Tradition 7

Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

Tradition 7 Checklist:

- Honestly now, do I do all I can to help A.A. (my group, my central office, my GSO) remain self-supporting? Could I put a little more into the basket on behalf of the new guy who can't afford it yet? How generous was I when tanked in a bathroom?
- Should the Grapevine sell advertising space to book publishers and drug companies, so
 it could make a big profit and become a bigger magazine, in full color, at a cheaper
 price per copy?
- If GSO runs short of funds some year, wouldn't it be ok to let the government subsidize A.A. groups in hospitals and prisons?
- Is it more important to get a big A.A. collection from a few people, or a smaller collection in which more members participate?
- Is a group's treasurer report unimportant A.A. business? How does the treasurer feel about it?
- How important in my recovery is the feeling of self-respect, rather than the feeling of being always under the obligation for charity received?

My Spiritual Experience

I thought about my spiritual awakening yesterday at work. I then come to realize, there are many definitions to spiritual awakening just as I am taught. Some define it as slowly growing into a spiritual way of life, the spiritual realm. Others call that bit of slow painful growth a series of spiritual experiences. I must view it from how my personal experiences go. I was blessed with many and both types of experiences. My purpose in this lifetime is to write a few books for the people of this world. I'm still not sure why because I am not very good at it. TaHee.

Anyway, my life seems to be an example of how to fail at doing things right or so the saying goes anyway. I seldom follow the guidance of people who I am sure are here to guide me. I just fail at most everything as I go it seems. I have come to understand that in order to write what I need to write for others, I needed to have a variety of failing experiences. Well fear not, that is exactly how my life goes. Yes, from the very start and long before recovery, I need to experience life in ways that others do not. Whelp, I continue to do just that.

Furthermore, I discover to then KNOW that my recovery needed to come completely by miracles. For the longest time, I am to fail at realizing that my/our Highest of Power performs them for me. That is exactly how it has gone. The reason I am sober and clean is because of His miracles. Seldom are my actions within life responsible for my ability to remain free of alcohol and drugs or anything else that needs to happen for that matter. Yes, that includes my ability to write. I am quite simply spoiled in this aspect of my life.

I have always been protected from serious harm throughout my life. Recovery has been no different. This is the reason my life goes as it goes. I see now a big part of my purpose in this lifetime is to understand the so-called "White Light" experience and that is exactly how my recovery life begins. I have it the first time I read through the Big Book. It lasts for several weeks before I screw that up or fail as I say. It is then that this-life experience. well in my case anyway, goes painfully slow to become the "Educational Type" awakening for the next 7 or 8 years. Yup, that is part of my purpose as well.

I then meet a man who is to help me understand more about this 'White Light' awakening. Well, church goers actually refer to it as, 'The Holy Ghost Comes Over Them' experience. He convinces me to go to Victory World Outreach at 4 AM in the mornings and Pray my heart out. Yes, it took him some time to convince me to follow his example. He tells me the "Holy Spirit" could come over me as it does others. I finally do this and indeed, that is exactly what happens to me. I have another "White Light" experience of the 'Holy Ghost' type.

Again, I can't handle it and fail at maintaining this experience as well. It lasted about a week before I became very angry and poof, it was gone. Yes, I think I just can't get it right. TaHee. I am then back into the educational type of life experiences again for another 7 years or so. I simply do not understand it at all and actually am not that interested in knowing. Then I meet a man who knows nothing of 12-Step work who shows me how to have this "White Light" experience anytime I like. He also shows me how to maintain it. This latter aspect is missing the other two times I have it. Ah-haw, there is a "Maintenance Plan" that one must master as well.

We both soon discover; he is one of the people I must write a book for. The experience I have with him is to be within the first book I write. No, I didn't just say, "Sure, I will do things your way, let's go try this." It takes him 9 months to talk me

into trying a spiritual awakening his way. No, it was never referred to as a 'White Light' or 'Spiritual Awakening' or 'Holy Ghost' between us. He simply referred to it as 'The Process' experience.

Well, the first time he performs it for me, I have the 'White Light' all right. It is better than ever this time. Plus, it quickly becomes evident that this same process will maintain it. Yes, but I also realize it is impossible to maintain a 'White Light' experience forever until certain things happen. Then comes the realization, I have never failed at it. Great, but oh darn, is my next thought. I want to keep it forever. 'The Process' continues to open up my mind so that the universe may reveal more truth about spiritual life as well as maintain the ability to have it. This 'Process' then becomes a wonderful asset in my life.

The point here is this: those first experiences are not of my own making. They all happen because my/our Highest of Power has them happen in my life along with many other miracles. The latter however, is one my now best ever friend is first responsible for. Thereafter as well as today, I am responsible for maintaining this amazing ability to awaken. Yes, I now employ the know-how. This then is what my first book is to be about. It is to be about how to overcome the obstacles that block one from the light of HP. This is what an awakening is all about. It is then that all the intelligence dwelling within the spiritual realm becomes available. My next book will be about how to overcome material-life trauma. I received a download from the universe the other day and was informed of three main topics that are to be within this next book.

So, what I KNOW today is that, until I had and understood how to maintain the "White Light" experience, I really hadn't had a spiritual awakening. So, this is why I say what I say. It is not to be superior or better than others or make anyone feel they aren't doing right. No, it is because of the experiences my Highest of Power puts me through in life. I am positive He wants everyone to understand what He has shown me. So, today, I define spiritual awakening as having and KNOWING how to maintain the "White Light" experience. Everyone can and are to have it is the point. Yup. My first book is to be called, "Love, Simple-Easy-Fun.

Archives Corner

From the Area Service Office Archives: Since July 4th is Independence Day, the Archives Committee is looking for the words "independence, freedom, and/or liberty," from artifacts and papers kept in the Archives of the Colorado Springs Area Service Office (ASO). Any errors are the sole responsibility of the writer, Doug L.

Let's start with an easy one in the Big Book (BB) of Alcoholics Anonymous. From ASO's BB second edition 13th printing 1972 Chapter Six "Into Action" comes one of the Promises: "We are going to know a new freedom and a new happiness."

Now let's take a look at paper flyers that the Archives Committee found scattered in multiple boxes, folders, and loose. All paper flyers have now been consolidated into one binder:

1. Pathway to Freedom: An Area Corrections Conference held at Basalt, CO April 1996. 2. Freedom Day Picnic: An

ASO fundraiser held at Palmer Park, COS, CO July 3, 2004. 3. Freedom Picnic: Sponsored by ASO held again at Lazyland Picnic Area, Palmer Park, COS, CO July 2, 2005. With a BBQ cooking contest, pit games and a speaker meeting.

- 4. "Freedom from Bondage" An Independence Day picnic at Antlers Park hosted by ASO. 5. Next is a three-day conference called OcSoberfest with the theme "A New Freedom and a New Happiness' held at Pueblo, CO with workshops, plenty of speakers, eating, music, and dancing.
- 6. The final paper flier announces the Area Delegate's Report on the 73rd General Service Conference held at Freedom Hall June 10, 2023 (AA's 88th birthday) on North El Paso Street, COS, CO. The Archives Committee has found decades of The Pikes Peak Pint in electronic format which has many more flyers to go through. But that's enough for now.

- The local district, which communicates directly with the groups, providing the district group conscience for the area assemblies, and serving as a link between the area delegates and the G.S.R.s.
- The area committee, which coordinates vital A.A. activities over a broad geographic area; sends a delegate to the
 annual General Service Conference; holds area assemblies to determine the needs of the Fellowship; and provides
 information at all levels of service.
- The local intergroup or central office, which may provide phone service for Twelfth Step calls and other inquiries; coordinates group activities; and facilitates A.A. literature sales, institutions work, public information, and cooperation with the professional community activities.
- A.A.'s General Service Office, which functions as a storehouse of A.A. information, communicating with members
 and groups around the world; publishes A.A.'s literature; and supplies information and experience to professionals
 and others interested
