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Tradition 1

Tradition 1 Checklist:

- Am I, in my group, a healing, mending, integrating person or am I divisive? What about gossip and taking other members' inventories?
- Am I a peacemaker? Or do I, with pious preludes such as "just for the sake of discussion" plunge into argument?
- Am I gentle with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?
- Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another?
- Do I put down some AA activities as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?
- Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole, or just the parts I understand and approve of?
- Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?
- Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?
- Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep me in touch?
- Do I share with AA all of me, the good and the bad, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?

Supporting A.A.'s services

While contributions cover each group's rent and other expenses, the Seventh Tradition is essential to all areas of A.A. service. It is both a privilege and a responsibility for groups and members to ensure that not only their group, but also their intergroup/central office, local services, district, area, and the General Service Office remain self-supporting. The General Service Conference suggests that individual groups, through an informed group conscience, adopt a specific contribution plan tailored to meet the group's financial situation. Once the group's expenses have been taken care of the group may decide to further carry the message by sending money to the following A.A. service entities.

- The local district, which communicates directly with the groups, providing the district group conscience for the area assemblies, and serving as a link between the area delegates and the G.S.R.s.
- The area committee, which coordinates vital A.A. activities over a broad geographic area; sends a delegate to the annual General Service Conference; holds area assemblies to determine the needs of the Fellowship; and provides information at all levels of service.
- The local intergroup or central office, which may provide phone service for Twelfth Step calls and other inquiries; coordinates group activities; and facilitates A.A. literature sales, institutions work, public information, and cooperation with the professional community activities.
- A.A.'s General Service Office, which functions as a storehouse of A.A. information, communicating with members
 and groups around the world; publishes A.A.'s literature; and supplies information and experience to professionals
 and others interested

Open Mindedness, Sobriety, and Sanity

I have been in enough meetings to hear some shares use the expression "they don't do A.A. right". It made sense - the meetings I chose to attend, stay sober with, and grow my program were (and still are) instrumental in my sobriety, and it was unlikely that other meetings would meet the standards I created. Sure, I would attend different meetings for a change of pace or to accommodate my current location while traveling or running errands, but ultimately I return to what is familiar. So whenever I would hear a fellow alcoholic make such a statement, I would smile and nod in understanding.

Then I found myself living in a different state. I recalled the suggestion given to me from a fellow alcoholic with significan time in sobriety who had relocated away from her A.A. community: "get active in the community as soon as possible". And so, I proceeded to immerse myself by visiting different meetings, and quickly realized I was comparing and contrasting A.A. groups and members with those I had left behind (see Tradition 1 checklist, questions four and five). The words "they don't do A.A. right" were growing louder in my head, and I realized I needed to make a decision and take action before I fell prey to misery, resentment, and loneliness.

I recognized I had a problem with the unfamiliar groups, the people, and their processes (also known as their group consciences). Feeling like a new-comer, I realized that I needed to believe that a power outside of myself could carry me through the biases, perceptions, and conditions I had created. Was I willing to let go of my ideas? I became aware of the precipice I was approaching that promised discontent, despair, and bitterness. Old behaviors, old thinking, and alcohol were waiting for me.

So I took an action I had never taken before. I breathed a prayer for open mindedness before passing through the doors of every A.A. meeting. Nothing fancy. Sometimes it was a resignation. Other times a sincere plea. It felt just like my pleas to stay sober in early sobriety. I knew that I didn't want to die emotionally or spiritually, just as I knew I didn't want to die when I thought I couldn't stop drinking. The willingness was the same. The honest appraisal was humbling. And I was changed.

I found myself desiring to be a part of. I dove into meetings in a manner I had never experienced. I found myself carrying the message to treatment centers and sober living homes. A retreat! I helped launch a spiritual retreat and spent a weekend with unfamiliar personalities, and remained internally peaceful. I learned how to be part of a group, gracefully share my experience from other groups, and remain in serenity when the group conscience overrode my (perfectly logical) suggestions. I developed new relationships and unknowingly strengthened my connection and reliance on a power that wasn't me. My sobriety changed.

I am grateful for the experience, and I am convinced it has everything to do with the peace I actively seek and receive to this day. I do not have the answers. There is not only one right way of doing things. These concepts are applicable to my personal relationships, my work, and the world around me. As a result, I do not have a need to drink today, for the mental and physical obsession has been removed. But the H.O.W. is a daily practice, in all of my affairs - honesty, open mindedness, and willingness, and it enables a daily reprieve for me from drinking.
