Tradition 8

Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

Tradition 8 Checklist:

- Is my own behavior accurately described by the traditions? If not, what needs changing?
- When I chafe about any particular Tradition, do I realize how it affects others? Do I sometimes try to get some reward even if not money for my personal A.A. efforts?
- Do I try to sound in A.A. like an expert on alcoholism? On recovery? On medicine? On sociology? On A.A. itself? On psychology? On spiritual matters? Or, heaven help me, even on humility?
- Do I make an effort to understand what A.A. employees do? What workers in other alcoholism agencies do? Can I distinguish clearly among them?
- In my own A.A. life, have I any experiences which illustrate the wisdom of this Tradition?
- Have I paid enough attention to the book *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*? To the pamphlet *A.A. Tradition How It Developed*?

Concept 8

The trustees are the principal planners and administrators of overall policy and finance. They have custodial oversight of the separately incorporated and constantly active services, exercising this through their ability to elect all the directors of these entities.

Service Lessons

As I step down from one year of being the editor of The Pine, I reflect about the experience I gained from this position.

I have many days of sobriety strung together, using the program of Alcoholics Anonymous, and service is often a topic of discussion of how one can stay sober one day at a time. Service, however, is relevant to the individual and it looks and works differently for everyone, I discovered. I cannot keep "this priceless gift" of sobriety unless I give it away... and giving it away operates in many different forms for me. One of those modes of service is learning (or improving) skills gained from sitting through uncomfortable A.A. group business meetings, volunteering for logistic roles at A.A. events, and taking on unfamiliar tasks while gaining confidence in my autonomy through A.A. related service positions. All of these experiences have contributed to personal and professional development, enabling me to be of maximum service to my co-workers, colleagues, friends and family in and outside of the A.A. circle. This has led to increased peace and joy in my life. My open-mindedness has increased, my penchant for impatience and exasperation has decreased, I'm better at understanding that I am not always right, nor that you are always wrong, and it's quite a bit easier to let go of a bruised ego.

My latest "service" experiences include Intergroup representation and communications. I returned to our beautiful state after a few years elsewhere, "changed" yet again through A.A. program principles and fellowships with a different air than what I was used to here in Colorado. While I was happy to be back, I could tell I was missing something after a year of grasping for familiar routines. So I did what I learned had worked before: I volunteered. I offered myself to fill an empty Intergroup position at my home group, and I attended my first Intergroup meeting in seventeen years of sobriety. As I sat through this new experience, I quickly learned that I would need to reel in my "what it should look like" idea, and got to work gathering neutral information about the role of Intergroup and the Area Service Office... www.aa.org is invaluable for resources, as well as our pamphlets! Listening to others with experience is fine, but we're really good at inserting our opinions and ideas, too. I needed facts so that I could determine, for myself, how to be of maximum service to my group. I attended my second Intergroup meeting, August 2022, and I learned of a service position sitting empty: The Pint editor. So I raised my hand – why not? I knew my way around a computer, so why can't I learn (or figure out) how to put a communications letter together?

I learned right away that not everyone is on the same self-imposed urgency schedule that I was on. So I learned grace, flexibility, and tone. I was given the O.K. that I didn't have to use the same platform that others used, so I learned autonomy, persistence and confidence in my chosen medium. I learned that compliance wasn't a bad thing – it was not unreasonable for me to create a PDF as an end result or to rename my file in a certain manner so that it would be easier for the distributors to manage. I gained and improved valuable qualities that translate outside of "work" as a result of these actions. The other night, someone told me I had publishing experience now. I would have never thought to add that to my resume.

Exactly one year later, outside of service terms and months after elections, someone approached me and said they were willing to take on The Pint. This is how it works. My job is to prepare the individual to the best of my ability for transition, and then allow them to do the deal. My job is to not judge, but to support their path. Zoom is awesome – I can record how I worked, and contribute it as a resource that might prove helpful to others. I can turn it over gracefully, and be thankful for the opportunity to be of service. This is how my recovery works... so I think I will keep coming back.

Archives Corner

From the Area Service Office (ASO) Archives: Continuing from **The Pikes Peak Pint July** article on artifacts and papers with the words "independence, freedom, and/or liberty," let's look for those words or variations in group/meeting names or locations. Any errors are the sole responsibility of the writer, Doug L.

Let's start with an easy one from the ASO on-line meeting directory: Meetings are held at the Freedom Hall located on North El Paso Street.

Now let's look for meetings and locations listed in AA directories beginning in the 1980s and continuing through 2015, paper meeting schedules from the early 2000s through 2015, and some on-line meetings:

Grupo Liberacion (liberation or release in Spanish) groups in the Springs and Pueblo. They were active in the early years of this century. No longer active.

Happy, Joyous, and Free group: Again, two groups in the Springs and Pueblo. The Springs group met at the Beth El Mennonite Church for a Friday evening open Big Book study. Both groups were active in the first decade of the 21st Century. No longer active.

Freedom From Bondage group met on Wahsatch Friday evenings for an open discussion meeting. No longer active.

Freedom From Addiction group met for years in Cascade, CO Sunday 1 p.m. No longer active

No groups that I could find included "Independence" or "Liberty" in their names or meeting locations. The ASO Archives contain many directories and paper meeting schedules with a wealth of information, so I could have missed something. If you know of any El Paso County or Teller County meetings with these names that I missed, please contact the Archives Committee at archives@coloradospringsaa.org.

Supporting A.A.'s services

While contributions cover each group's rent and other expenses, the Seventh Tradition is essential to all areas of A.A. service. It is both a privilege and a responsibility for groups and members to ensure that not only their group, but also their intergroup/central office, local services, district, area, and the General Service Office remain self-supporting. The General Service Conference suggests that individual groups, through an informed group conscience, adopt a specific contribution plan tailored to meet the group's financial situation. Once the group's expenses have been taken care of the group may decide to further carry the message by sending money to the following A.A. service entities.

- The local district, which communicates directly with the groups, providing the district group conscience for the area assemblies, and serving as a link between the area delegates and the G.S.R.s.
- The area committee, which coordinates vital A.A. activities over a broad geographic area; sends a delegate to the annual General Service Conference; holds area assemblies to determine the needs of the Fellowship; and provides information at all levels of service.
- The local intergroup or central office, which may provide phone service for Twelfth Step calls and other inquiries; coordinates group activities; and facilitates A.A. literature sales, institutions work, public information, and cooperation with the professional community activities.
- A.A.'s General Service Office, which functions as a storehouse of A.A. information, communicating with members and groups around the world; publishes A.A.'s literature; and supplies information and experience to professionals and others interested
