Happy April and welcome to spring! As we refresh in the beauty of nature's rejuvenation, we consider the 4th Step, a searching and fearless moral inventory. The 4th Step is often liked to "Spring Cleaning". The Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous makes clear that "A business which takes no regular inventory usually goes broke. Taking a commercial inventory is a fact-finding and a fact-facing process. It is an effort to discover the truth about the stock-in-trade. Its object is to disclose damaged or unsalable goods, to get rid of them promptly and without regret. If the owner of the business is to be successful, he cannot fool himself about values.

We do exactly the same thing with our lives. We take stock honestly. First, we search out the flaws in our make-up which have caused our failure. Being convinced that self, manifested in various ways, is what has defeated us, we consider its common manifestations."

Consider the following on the importance of our own "Spring Cleaning"

Since I cannot speak for anyone else, I'll have to make my experience with the 4th step autobiographical. Before A.A., I tried almost daily to stop drinking. I hated myself constantly. I could not understand why such a wonderful person as I was would do the things I did. I was in a constant state of mental turmoil and misery, and I knew that I could not handle liquor.

On coming into A.A., I had already taken the 1st step, but the 2nd and 3rd steps were discouraging, as I had no faith in a Higher Power. I tried to believe, and would have gladly forced myself to do so, were that possible, because I really wanted to succeed with the A.A. program. However, I skipped over these for the moment, as I was advised to do, and went on to the 4th step. . . .

I tried to make a "searching and fearless moral inventory," and discovered that it was difficult to push my pride and egotism aside sufficiently to get a better view of myself. My first attempt was neither searching nor fearless, but it was a very important start, and I developed and revised it over many months. During this time, I began to see myself as a person who was riddled with resentments, selfishly expecting life to treat me well; a super-sensitive person always inclined to feel hurt about everything that was not to my liking, and intolerant of any opinion differing from my own. I began to see that my thinking was based on fear and vague worries. I saw more. I realized that this very special person I had imagined myself to be could do nothing directly against the power of alcohol. But I began to see how the person I was beginning to understand could outflank old John and attack the cause of the drinking.

For years, I had wanted desperately to do something about my drinking. This, I knew, was impossible. But the 4th step taught me that I could do something about the cause of my drinking. By trying to do something about myself, I found that I did not need to drink. The 4th step showed me what was needed to be done. Without this knowledge, I doubt if sobriety would have been possible for me. The 4th step is just that important.

These questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in November 1969 and ran through September 1971. While they were originally intended primarily for individual use, many AA groups have since used them as a basis for wider discussion.

Tradition Four: Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole.

- 1. Do I insist that there are only a few right ways of doing things in AA?
- 2. Does my group always consider the welfare of the rest of AA? Of nearby groups? Of Loners in Alaska? Of Internationalists miles from port? Of a group in Rome or El Salvador?
- 3. Do I put down other members' behavior when it is different from mine, or do I learn from it?
- 4. Do I always bear in mind that, to those outsiders who know I am in AA, I may to some extent represent our entire beloved Fellowship?
- 5. Am I willing to help a newcomer go to any lengths—his lengths, not mine—to stay sober?
- 6. Do I share my knowledge of AA tools with other members who may not have heard of them?

DIFFERENCES VS SIMILARITIES

I have been in the rooms a while and have had the pleasure of attending meetings all over the continental US. In the ego of my youth, I even had dreams of becoming a circuit speaker...this was directly following my decision (quickly changed) to become a counselor. I had always been good with words, and I felt that recovery was where I could best share this gift as I had so much to give, so much knowledge to share.

Afterall, we were speaking of at least six months sobriety!!

I was introduced to the program in the summer of 1986 at Club 12 in San Antonio, TX. Shortly after coming into AA, Club 12 was celebrating its 37th anniversary with a weekend of food, fellowship and speaker meetings. I had already heard the 'look for the similarities, not the differences'. I knew I had a problem, but it wasn't as bad as yours... I was different! I was unique! I had a lot of 'things', really nice 'things', I just hadn't gone down the rabbit hole as far as you. I was still too new to understand the nature of our disease. I just knew something was missing in my life, that Jack Daniels made things go away for a while, and then it didn't.

On Sunday morning, the speaker was straight out of Little House on the Prairie! What a school marm. I figured she must have been the AlAnon speaker; no respectable alcoholic would show up dressed so primly, complete with braids forming a crown on the top of her head. What on earth could I learn from this woman. I was after a woman who shopped at the finest boutiques and department stores, used designer fragrances, got my hair and nails done every week, drove a sports car. Look for the similarities!

Bah...no way could there be anything even minutely interesting for me to learn from the 1986 Ma Kettle!!

The very large meeting room was filled to capacity as everyone hurried to get that last bit of coffee, speak to friends, and find a seat. I didn't really know anyone, hadn't bothered to get to know anyone because we had nothing in common, so I stood alone along the back wall. And then she began to share her story...

After all this time, I do not remember the details. I cannot recall what she said that snapped me to attention. But she knew me. She knew my greatest fear because it had been her overriding fear. The fear that she felt so sure would be erased by taking the edge off with just one little drink, and then another, and then...... darkness. A fear with which she had lived for years, which tainted every relationship, which was only relieved by the warmth of her drink, which became ever more demanding as time went by, until the day came when she didn't even recognize herself. Didn't know the woman that looked back at her from the mirror, the woman who so feared being abandoned that she would give her very soul to be rid of the fear....and who had in fact given her soul to demon alcohol in search of that release. I knew that fear, that fear that I could not describe to anyone, that fear that constantly took me to my friends, Jack and Jose, to ease the loneliness, the fear of being forever unworthy of being loved, that took me to oblivion. I had heard the similarity.

And all this tale is by way of saying we never know the story someone carries with them. We never really get to know the joys and the sorrows of others until we listen to their stories, stories which can be shared over a cup of coffee, driving to a meeting, not just from the podium. Listening for the similarities, not judging on the differences.

How many times do we walk into a room and see someone new to our meeting – or we are new to a meeting. We generally gravitate only to those in whom we anticipate similarities. But what might we learn if we reach out to someone different, how might that change our realization of the true nature of our disease, how might that give us insight into a whole new world.... Just because we were willing to look beyond the differences! And find the similarities were there all along.........



Convention tales:



While contributions cover each group's rent and other expenses, the Seventh Tradition is essential to all areas of A.A. service.
